SEEKING LANDOWNERS INTERESTED IN PARTICIPATING



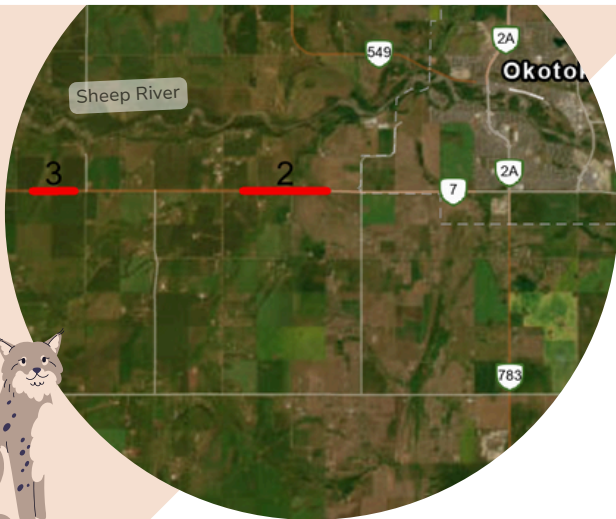
Project Purpose

The Miistakis Institute, a not-for-profit research institute affiliated with Mount Royal University, is studying wildlife movement and the natural connections across the landscape. Remote cameras will help us better understand animal movement near areas of high animal-vehicle collisions on provincial highways (Highways 22, 1, and 1A). We aim to learn more about wildlife in the region, and how to support future planning to keep people and wildlife safe.

Do you live in these areas?

We are looking for properties within ~0-10 km away from three highway sites (shown in red on maps) to install cameras:

Highway 7, just west of Okotoks



Highway 2, just south of High River



About the Cameras and Access Required:

- Wildlife only: Human images are auto-blurred and never shared.
- Low impact: Cameras are placed on game trails, paths, or other areas where wildlife movement is likely. Cameras are visited 3-4 times a year until spring 2028, visits coordinated in advance.
